Both these are fairly similar drugs; they can slow the progression of Alzheimer's. They don't reverse it; they don't make you better but keep you from getting worse.

A couple things about these – first, they're given by IV. So, they put a needle in your arm and drip it in for an hour or so. You have to meet certain criteria to qualify for this, and they're very expensive.
